GENERAL OBJECTIVE

Aims to contribute to improvements in overall cancer control through:

- quality based cancer screening programmes,
- better integration of cancer care,
- community-based cancer care approaches,
- providing concerted efforts in all aspects of survivorship, including palliative care





KEY CONCEPTUAL THEMES - CCCNS

- Extensive discussion, elaboration and agreement on the definition of a CCCN
- Providing for a framework for an integration of services in a Comprehensive Cancer Control Network
- Successful pilot implementation of a Comprehensive Cancer Care Network in the Czech Republic
- Exploring the potential in several EU member states (e.g. Italy, Hungary, UK, Germany), though with different triggers and roles of stakeholders





KEY CONCEPTUAL THEMES – AFTER-CARE

- The original idea was slightly modified > moving from a concept of hospital-based after-care into a mixed or, predominantly, primary and community-based after-care
- A general lack of agreement on the contents and frequency of followup
- Important and very relevant work of international professional and scientific associations, e.g. ESMO, ASCO
- The need for more focus on:
 - patient needs,
 - secondary and tertiary prevention,
 - clear and transparent role of actors,
 - transfer and access to files and all relevant clinical data





KEY CONCEPTUAL THEMES - SURVIVORSHIP

- Definition of survivorship
- Exploration of the issues related to the concept of survivorship
- The development of a European organisational framework to address survivorship, rehabilitation and palliative care
- Conceptualisation of the survivorship period and its implication through its integration into a unique patient pathway – the setup of a Survivorship Care Plan (SCP)





KEY CONCEPTUAL THEMES – SCREENING

- Development of scientific evidence for guidance and recommendations
- Guidance on the following cancer sites:
 - Cervix
 - Breast
 - Colo-rectum
 - Stomach
 - Prostate
 - Lung
